SOURCE A

Arkwright was a severe economist of time; that he might not waste a moment Arkwright generally travelled with four horses, at rapid speed.

His businesses in Derbyshire Lancashire and Scotland were so extensive as to show at once his all-grasping spirit. In many of the businesses he generally managed in such a way that whoever lost, he himself was a gainer.

So unbounded was his confidence in the success of his machinery and the national wealth to be produced by it he would say that he could 'pay the National Debt!'


SOURCE E

Derby Mercury - Arkwright's Death 9th August 1792

Last Friday, at his house in Cromford, Sir Richard Arkwright, Knight died; Through persistence and industrious activity, he invented and perfected a system of spinning machinery; which was unsuccessfully attempted by many other mechanics of the last and present centuries. By giving continuous employment to many thousand families, the population increased and greater commercial strength was gained for this country, contributing more to the benefit of mankind, in so short a period of time, than any human ingenuity.
